Dear NAYA Scholarship Donors,

Thank you for your continued generosity and commitment to investing in the next generation. At a time when access to education is increasingly complex, your support provides more than financial assistance; it creates opportunity, stability, and hope.

Last year, we piloted a new matched savings component of the scholarship, allowing recipients to allocate a portion of their award into a 5:1 matched account. The results were powerful. This year, three of our five recipients opted to deposit \$600 of their award into the matched account, which was multiplied to \$3,000 per student, adding \$2,400 in match funds per participant. Thanks to your support and their strategic choices, the \$13,000 in scholarships awarded this year leveraged an additional \$7,200 in match funds, bringing the total financial impact to \$20,200.

This kind of innovation and success would not be possible without your belief in our students and your dedication to long-term, community-driven solutions. Thank you for standing alongside education, students, and us at NAYA Family Center.

A NOTE FROM A NAYA SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT


Dear NAYA Scholarship Donor,
